Youth Leadership Conference (YLC) Update

Companions, thanks this year is that after two years of COVID, for your strong support students are flat worn out. They and their families have carried a terrible burden due to our ongoing YLC program. Here is a short update on North Texas Chapter (234) recruitment for the 2022 Class of Youth Leadership Conferences.

COVID-19 and while they are strong and resilient, they are also tired. There are several schools we contacted were councilors had a difficult time generating interest for these reasons. This is obvious in across our Order as recruitment totals are down as compared to years past. It will be a point of interest after this year's YLC to do a better job advertising and generating interest.

Our Chapter has exceeded our recruitment goal; we set a target of to recruit and fund 30 students to attend this years YLC. To date we have recruited 34, with 33 formally nominated (I await one student to tell us which YLC she can attend). We also increased our outreach to schools, doubling the number of schools we contacted and creating a new strategic relationship with the Garland ISD. In coordination with the Dallas Chapter, moving forward, our Chapter will be responsible for Garland ISD, along with the other Districts we previously worked with – Frisco ISD, Rockwall ISD and Wylie ISD. We also added Caddo Mills ISD to our list this year with three students nominated.

Now we turn our focus and attention to registering each student. Despite our success in achieving goal, in working with councilors, students and their families, my observation

So, What Happens at the Texas A&M University Youth Leadership Conference?

The students arrive on campus between 1200-1300 on Sunday, the first day of the conference. They get checked into their dorm room, meet their roommate, are assigned to one of eight teams, and head to their Introduction and Orientation to the Conference at 1400.

We don't let any grass grow under their feet as selected teams begin planning for the mock trial to be held the next day. The rest of the teams participate in Workshop Discussions entitled "Leaders I Admire" and "Defining Leadership." Each Team delivers their consensus on the leaders they admire and their definition of leadership to the rest of the conference. All students are in quarters by 2230 and "Lights Out" is at 2300.

Roll call is at 0645 followed by breakfast at 0715 and an optional devotional at 0810 in the All Faiths Chapel. Workshops begin at 0845 with "Identifying Top National Issues" and then "Prioritizing the Top National Issues." Again, each Team briefs their issues, arrived at by consensus of the group to the rest of the conference. By this time, you are seeing the leaders in each group begin to emerge.

After lunch, the Mock Trial titled "Carla Jensen vs. White Star Line" set against the events surrounding the sinking of the Titanic is presided over by Justice Lana Myers, a Hereditary Perpetual Member of the Order and a Justice on the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in Texas. One team prosecutes the case, another team defends White Star Line, and another team acts as the jury and decides the case. By this time all the teams are working well together. After the trial, Justice Myers discusses the Law and citizens' role in the judicial system.

We close out the second day with a presentation from CAPT Marc Liebman, a Perpetual Member, military aviator, military intelligence analyst, former CEO, and an author. Marc's presentation, "Leadership by Example" is always rated highly by the students. We close out Day 2 with talent show preparations. Besides individual and

group talent presentations, each team has to develop a skit for the talent show. The day ends with all students in quarters by 2230 and "Lights Out" is at 2300.

Day 3 begins just as Day 2 did with roll call, breakfast and optional devotional and our first speaker of the day, Royce Hickman, a former Chamber of Commerce President for the State of Texas speaking on "American Exceptionalism." Then a workshop on "Federal Control vs. Free Enterprise" with the consensus opinion briefed to the conference. This day is speaker heavy with the Honorable Henry Cisneros explaining to the students that they "Are the Leaders of Tomorrow" and what the expectations are. Dr. Andrew Rettenmaier presents "Free Enterprise and Capitalism," followed by our own Col Mark Kipphut explaining that "Freedom Isn't Free." One more workshop on "Supreme Court Decisions: The Ten Amendments" closes out the work for the day. After dinner it is time to enjoy the Talent Show! It is an evening of amazing talent filled with laughs. The day ends with all students in quarters by 2230 and "Lights Out" is at 2300.

Wednesday begins just as the previous two days have and the first workshop is "Thank You Letters" to the students' sponsoring organizations followed by a visit to the Sanders Corps of Cadets Center and the President George H.W. Bush Presidential Library. The day concludes with our formal banquet. Students, parents and some of the presenters from the week enjoy the receiving line, conversation, a good meal and a excellent speaker. In the past, our speakers have included the Honorable Allen West, LTG Rick Lynch and LTG John Campbell.

Are you tired yet? The students certainly are, but they depart on Thursday having made lifelong friends and are inspired to be better leaders in their school organizations and beyond.

Friendship - 1 Samuel 23:14-18

"A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for a time of adversity." – Proverbs 17:17

Jonathan found David to both help him and instill in David the need to "find strength in God." (1 Samuel 23:16). Jonathan was willing to place himself at risk to help his friend and spread the word of God.

This is the essence of Christian friendship – spreading to others the promise of eternal life. In friendship we help each other in the times of celebration and sorrow by leaving them with greater understanding of God's wisdom and love.

Historical US Military Events

May 2, 2011 - U.S. Special Operations Forces killed Osama bin Laden during a raid on his secret compound in Abbottabad, Pakistan.

May 5, 1865 - Decoration Day was first observed in the U.S., with the tradition of decorating soldiers' graves from the Civil War with flowers. The observance date was later moved to May 30th and included American graves from World War I and World War II, and became better known as Memorial Day.

May 7, 1945 - German General Alfred Jodl signed the unconditional surrender of all German fighting forces thus ending World War II in Europe.

May 8, 1942 - During World War II in the Pacific, the Battle of the Coral Sea began in which Japan would suffer its first defeat of the war.

May 13, 1846 - At the request of President James K. Polk, Congress declared war on Mexico. The war resulted in the annexation of New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, California, Utah and Colorado.

May 14, 1942 - Act of Congress allowed women to enlist for noncombat duties in the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC), the Women Appointed for Voluntary Emergency Service (WAVES), Women's Auxiliary Ferrying Squadron (WAFS), and Semper Paratus Always Ready Service (SPARS), the Women's Reserve of the Marine Corp.

Monday May 30, 2022 — Memorial Day Observed

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Memorial Day - Monday 30 May 2022

Memorial Day on May 30 conjures images of hamburgers, hot dogs, swimming pools, and summertime for many Americans. But the last Monday in May serves, most importantly, as a time to honor those who died while fighting in the U.S. Armed Forces. It's a holiday steeped in somber American history and tradition. The day actually began as "Decoration Day," following the Civil War, when mourners placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers. Yes, Memorial Day has also come to signify the "unofficial" start of summer, but let's remember the heroes who made it all possible.

approximately the same size as those that attend today's observance — about 5,000 people. Small American flags were placed on each grave — a tradition still followed at many national cemeteries today. In recent years, the custom has grown in many families to decorate the graves of all departed loved ones.

By 1890, each Northern state had made Decoration Day an official holiday. But this was not the case in the South, where states continued to honor their dead on separate days until after the First World War.



The History of Memorial Day: The Civil War ended in the spring of 1865 when Robert E. Lee surrendered the last major Confederate army to Ulysses S. Grant at the Appomattox Court

The May 30 date held for decades. But, in 1968, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Day as the last Monday in May in order to create a three-day weekend for federal employees. The change took place in 1971. The same law also declared Memorial Day a federal holiday.

House on April 9. Over 620,000 soldiers died in the four-year conflict. General John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic (an organization of Union veterans) would eventually select May 30, 1868, as a day to pay tribute to the fallen:

"The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land..."

General Logan apparently chose May 30 because flowers would be in bloom all over the country. By the end of the 19th century, Memorial Day ceremonies were being held on May 30 throughout the nation. States passed proclamations, and the Army and Navy adopted rules for proper observance at their facilities.

The crowd attending the first Memorial Day ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery was

How to Observe Memorial Day:

1. **Pay your respects** - Lay flowers on the grave of a family member or friend who died while serving. If you don't personally know any fallen soldiers, visit a local cemetery anyway. After all, they made the ultimate sacrifice for you.
2. **Participate in the National Moment of Remembrance** - By doing so, you'll be joining millions of Americans in national unity to honor Memorial Day for what it truly is — a day to remember those who laid down their lives in service of their country and its citizens.
3. **Fly the flag** - If you have an American flag at home, be sure to fly it at half-mast until noon, then raise it to full mast for the rest of the day. The practice of lowering and then raising the flag has been observed for over 100 years to symbolize America's persistence in the face of loss.

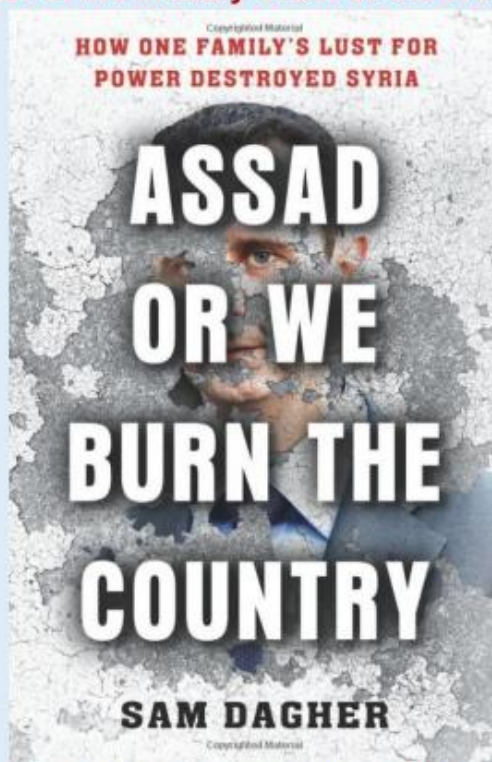

MOWW was founded at the suggestion of General of the Armies John J. "Blackjack" Pershing 1919 to promote good citizenship, patriotic education, and military and public service. The purpose of our Order is found in the 9 tenets described in our Preamble.

MOWW chapters provide opportunities to support veterans of all ranks and service, youth

patriotic education, college ROTC and high school JROTC, Scouting, monuments and memorials, law and order, national and homeland security programs, and inculcate and stimulate love of our country and flag.

If you qualify, we want you serving alongside us. Eligibility is open to active duty, retired and former commissioned or warrant officers of the uniformed services of the United States: U.S. Army, U.S. Navy, U.S.

Marine Corps, U.S. Coast Guard, U.S Air Force, and U.S Space Force. It also includes the United States Public Health Service (USPHS), and the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Family members who are directly related to eligible officers within two degrees of consanguinity (i.e., spouse, son/stepson, daughter/step-
